GUIDED ASSESSMENT OF INTERVENTION NEEDS

FOR CHILDREN WITH CONCERNING SEXUAL BEHAVIOUR

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STATIC VARIABLES

Static factors are those that cannot change/alter.

These risk factors include issues/ characteristics that have **ever occurred** or been true for the child.

1.0 CHARACTERISTICS OF SEXUAL BEHAVIOURS

1.1 - Use of Force/ Threat/ Violence

YES	During any sexual behaviour or in an attempt to keep any of the sexual behaviours a secret, child has ever used:	
	• Excessive force or violence • Threatened to use force or violence	
	 Used intimidation against the victim Physical strength to gain compliance 	
POSSIBLY/	During any sexual behaviour or in an attempt to keep sexual behaviour a secret, child <i>may</i> have used	
PARTIALLY	force/ threat or violence as outlined above.

1.2 - Coercion/ Manipulation

YES	Child has ever used nonviolent means to attain cooperation during sexual behaviours, which could have included, but are not limited to: ● Bribes ● Manipulation ● Tricks ● Coercion

2.4 - Witnessed Violence

	• Family violence (seen or heard)

POSSIBLY/	May have witnessed, been exposed to, or been privy to violence as outlined above

3.0 FAMILY AND ENVIRONMENT

3.1 - Poor Family Sexual Boundaries/ Sexualized Family Environment

DYNAMIC VARIABLES

Dynamic factors are those that can change.

Items are specific to situations/circumstances for the previous six months, currently, or for the next six months.

Please note the time frame for each item.

1.0 CHARACTERISTICS OF SEXUAL BEHAVIOURS

1.9 - Sexual Thoughts/ Fantasies (past 6 months)

YES	Over the <i>past six months</i> , the child has had inappropriate sexual thoughts or fantasies. Age			
	inappropriate sexual fantasies/ thoughts about things outside of what is natural and expected sexual			
	behaviour for child's age group.* Inappropriate sexual thoughts/ fantasies may be demonstrated			
	through, but are not limited to:			
	• Adult themes (e.g. a six year-old fantasizing about intercourse)*			
	The urge to sexually abuse during self-stimulation			
	Thoughts/ fantasies of sexual violence			
	Thoughts/ fantasies of sexual coercion			
	Thoughts/ fantasies of sexual aggression			
	• Fantasies/ thoughts include age, size, or status differences*			
	• Sexual fantasies/ thoughts, which include themes of power and control.			
POSSIBLY/	Over the past six months <i>may</i> have had an inappropriate sexual thought/fantasy as outlined above			
PARTIALLY				
NO	Has <i>never</i> had an inappropriate sexual thought/fantasy over the past six months.

1.12 - Lacks Understanding of Consequences of Sexual Behaviours (current)

1.13 - Opportunities for Sexual Behaviour* (next 6 months)

	with others. Opportunities can include, but are not limited to:			
	Living with and/or allowed access to potential victims			
	• Guardians who are unable to control child • Child will not receive adequate supervision			
	• Child will rarely be monitored by people who are aware of the sexual behaviours			
	* Consider all areas of life, e.g. school, extracurricular activities, and home			
POSSIBLY/	Over the <i>next six months</i> , child <i>may</i> have opportunity to engage in continued sexual behaviours

2.0 VICTIMIZATION HISTORY

If the child is not a victim of sexual abuse, skip to item 2.7

2.5 - Trauma from own Sexual Victimization (current)

YES	Child <i>currently</i> has unresolved trauma related to <i>own sexual victimization</i> history. Trauma may be		
	displayed by intrusive thoughts or memories, dissociation, nightmares, sleeping difficulties,		
	emotionality, feelings of helplessness, etc. Child has not received required treatment for

PARTIALLY	require treatment for sexual victimization		
NO	• Has received treatment for own sexual victimization history

2.6 - Arousal to Memories of own Sexual Victimization (current)

YES	Child <i>currently</i> sexually aroused to thoughts or discussions of own sexual victimization experiences

2.7 - Impact of Nonsexual Victimization (current)

YES	Child <i>is the victim</i> of a nonsexual abuse (i.e. physical, emotional abuse, neglect, or other nonsexual				
	abuse) AND <i>currently experiences</i> the negative emotional impact from this abuse (e.g. trauma,				
	sadness, anxiety, etc)				
POSSIBLY/	May currently experience the negative emotional impact of past nonsexual abuse, as outlined above

3.0 FAMILY AND ENVIRONMENT

3.2 - Family in Denial (current)

3.3 - Family Instability (past 6 months)

YES	Over the <i>past six months</i> , <i>2 or more</i> indicators of family instability were present. Instability can include, but is not limited to:				
	 A history of protective services Multiple parental figures Strangers in and out of home Economic stressors No sense of predictability/orderliness Unexplained absent parent Frequent residential moves 				
	• Family disruptions (e.g. divorce, out of home placements)				
POSSIBLY/	Over the <i>past six months</i> , <i>one</i> family instability indicator was definitely present OR <i>two or more</i>

3.4 - Negative Home Environment (past 6 months)

3.5 - Parental/ Guardian Rejection (past 6 months)

4.0 VIOLENCE AND CONTROL

4.1 - Impulsivity (past 6 months)

YES	Over the <i>past six months</i> , child has been impulsive or demonstrated poor self-control. Impulsivity						
	and poor self-control can include, but are not limited to:						
	• Acting before thinking • Unable to wait turn • Interrupting others

4.2 - History of Nonsexual Aggression (past 6 months)

Nonsexual aggression can include, but is not limited to: • Threatening • Demanding • Attacking others/ fighting/ hitting • Oppositional behaviours • Manipulative • Cruelty towards people or animals • Age inappropriate temper tantrums • Poor anger control (<i>i.e.</i> rage, explosive, unpredictable anger, etc)

4.3 - Aggressive Thoughts/ Fantasies (past 6 months)

	• Play that suggests thoughts/ fantasies of harming and/ or aggression towards others.					
POSSIBLY/	Over the <i>past six months</i> , child <i>may</i> have had aggressive nonsexual fantasies or thoughts

4.4 - Power-Based Beliefs (past 6 months)

YES	Over the <i>past six months</i> , child has held views that support power-based beliefs and/ or behaviours.

5.3 - Poor Self-Esteem (past 6 months)

	 Negative self-statements Lack of assertiveness Lacking goals No internal sense of self Negative self-talk No understanding of own needs 					
	• Interpreting situations with negative self-conclusions					
	• Feels incapable of positive and/or consistent action					
POSSIBLY/	Over the <i>past six months</i> , child <i>may</i> have demonstrated low-self esteem. Low self-esteem may be					
PARTIALLY	demonstrated through, but is not limited to, those issues listed above
